• H I. *Shn G. Hanumanth Rao (Mulug)* Will the hon. Mmister for Commerce and Industries be pleased to state \*

(1) Whether it is a fact that a lecturer in Economics from Nizam College has been appointed as Deputy Director of Commerce and Industries as mentioned by the Public Service Commission at page 20 of its Report ?

(2) If so, the name of the person so appointed ?

(3) Whether the Public Service Commission agreed to the appointment ?

(4) If not, why the Government did not revert the concerned person to his original post after six months ?

(5) Whether the said person has been confirmed in the Commerce and Industries Department ?

(6) If so, whether the Public Service Commission has approved his confirmation ?

(7) If not, the reasons for such Confirmation by the Government ?

*The Minister for Commerce and Industries (Shri Vtmyak Rao Vtdyalankar)* \*

(1) **The** answer is in the affirmative.

(2) **The** name of the person so appointed is Dr. R.V, Rao,

(3) **The** Public Service Commission did not agree to **hit** appointment.

(4) It was decided by the previous Government to set aside the recommendation of the Public Service Commission and to appoint him as Deputy Director. The question of reversion therefore did not arise.

(5) Yes.

(6) Since it was decided to set aside the original recommendation of the Public Service Commission a further reference to them for confirmation was not necessary.

(7) The reason for Dr Rao's confirmation was that he had the background of knowledge in cottage industries, which rendered him suitable for the post of this nature.

\*94. *Shn VD Deshpande (Ippaguda)* • Will the hon. Minister  
for Finance be pleased to state :

(1) Whether he is aware that the staff m the Finance Depart-  
ment with a number of gazetted officers is top-heavy ?

(2) If so, whether steps will be taken to prune the estimates of the department to absolute minimum by doing away with the superfluous posts ?

*The Minister for Finance (Dr GS Melkote)* 1 The staff in the Finance Department is not top-heavy because the Finance Department in Hyderabad is entrusted with certain functions which are not ordinarily discharged by the Finance Departments of other States in India

2 A request to the Finance Counsellor has however already been made to look into this case and to advise us to what extent the present strength of officers and staff of the Finance Department is expensive. Appropriate action will be taken on his advice.

*Shri V D Deshpande* What are the extra functions entrusted to the Finance Dept in this State ?

*Dr G S Melkote* A complete list is not here. Customs, Sales Tax, Stamp Manufacture, Currency, Pre-Audit etc, are under the purview of the Finance Department.

*Shri V D Deshpande* Is it not a fact that after financial integration, certain Departments have been handed over to the Centre and therefore the duties of the Finance Department have been considerably reduced ?

May I also know the branches that have been transferred to the Centre ?

*Dr G S Melkote* Certain branches like the Income Tax, Railways and certain sections of Currency control have, no doubt, been transferred to the Centre and to that extent, there has already been retrenchment of the staff.

*Shri V D Deshpande* : I think control of currency has been handed over to the Centre.

*Dr G S\* Melkote* Not entirely. Management of certain denominations of Hyderabad currency is still with us.

*Shri V D. Deshpande* May I know within what period temporary officers in the Finance Department are made permanent ?

*Dr. G.S Melkolte* : I do not quite follow the question.

*Dr. G.S. Melkote* I require notice.

*Shri V D Deshpande* Is it a fact that some officers who were taken temporarily were confirmed within one year ?

*Dr G S Melkote* I have no information

*Shri V D Deshpande* Is it a fact that in Madras, they are able to manage with one Secretary, one Deputy Secretary and two Assistant Secretaries and at the time of the budget season, they take one more Deputy Secretary ? Would it not be possible to manage with the same strength of staff here too ?

*Dr G S Melkote* All this is being examined. As I have already stated the Finance Department of the Hyderabad Government have still certain additional functions which States like Madras do not have and hence no curtailment is possible at present.

*Shri G Hanumantha Rao* • How many Deputy and Assistant Secretaries are there in the Finance Department?

*Dr GS Melkote* Secretary 1, Joint Secretary 1, Deputy Secretaries 3 in the main Finance Department and one in-charge of Supply Finance. Assistant Secretaries :10.

*Shri V D Deshpande* What is the explanation of the Finance Department in regard to the criticism that much of the staff in the Department is superfluous?

*Dr. G S Melkote* I do not think so.

*Dr G S. Melkote* I require notice

*Mr Speaker* We shall proceed to the next question. This question No 95 stands in the name of Shri M. Buchiah, "Why and since when an amount of Rs. 31,000 is being paid by the Government to the Press Trust of India?",

I think this question has already been answered in the **House**.

## Unstarred Questions and Answers

### CENTRAL LABORATORIES

52. *ShnKV Narayana Reddy* (Rajgopalpeth) Will the hon Minister for Commerce and Industries be pleased to state —

(a) Whether he is aware that proportionately more money and attention is being paid to the personnel of the Central Laboratories for scientific and industrial research of Hyderabad ?

(b) Is it detrimental to the proper equipment of the Laboratories ?

(c) What results have been achieved by the Central Laboratories so far ?

(d) Whether it is a fact that there was embezzlement of Government funds in the said laboratories ?

(e) If so, what steps have been taken in the matter ?

*Shrt Vinayak Rao Koratkar Vidyalkar*—In the recurring grants to the Laboratories there is a higher provision for salaries than for laboratory charges. This is however not abnormal and compares favourable with similar ratios in other laboratories and institutions.

(b) The answer is in the negative. In addition to the recurring grant to the Laboratory an aggregate of approximately Rs. 20 lakhs have been provided during the last few years as non-recurring grants for the purchase of equipment. More over a good deal of equipment has been purchased from disposals at special rates sanctioned by the Government of India for Research institutions.

The equipment and organization of the Laboratories has been undertaken in consultation with eminent scientists in India\* The research programme of the Laboratories is also scrutinised very closely by the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research of the Government of India.



(c) The main achievements of the Central Laboratories are :—

(z) Eleven patents for processes worked out in the laboratories have been obtained and await commercial exploitation. In addition to the above there are five applications pending. The following processes worked out in the laboratory await commercial exploitation and deserve special mention —

(a) Manufacture of dehydrated castor oil.

(b) Manufacture of Ricinoleic acid

(c) Manufacture of Strychnine from locally available Nux Vomica

(d) Production of Potash from Felspar

(e) Production of white cement as a bye-product of potash from felspar.

(f) Production of glue and gelatine from bones and utilisation of residue bone as a fertiliser.

(g) Utilisation of iron pyrites for the manufacture of fine chemicals like manganus sulphate

(h) Preparation of Sand lime bricks and clinker Bricks.

(II) The number of research papers published in scientific journals and reports read by the members of the staff of the Central Laboratories before scientific bodies are 38 and 47 respectively

Some of the items of the present research programme are :—

1 Utilization of molasses for the production of food yeast and certain fine chemicals of industrial importance.

2. Utilisation of castor oil as basis for fatty acid and fine chemical industry

3 Preparation of active fuller's earth from locally available earths

4 Utilisation of sulphates for the production of Sulphuric acid.

5. Preparation of titanium and titanium oxide with bauxite sludge.

6. Low temperature carbonisation of coal by fmdization technique. A pilot plant has recently been obtained from Germany and erection work is under progress. Besides being able to supply about 18 to 20 tons of coke and smokeless fuel this plant is expected to give valuable data for the future development of coal, tar\* and gas industries.

- 7 Solvent extraction of vegetable oil cakes by alcohol.
8. Preparation of active charcoal from groundnut husks and its utilisation in oil and sugar refining industry
9. Preparation of synthetic analgesics
- 10 Preparation of menthol from Indian turpentine
11. Preparation of vanillin from hgnine—a bye-product of Sirpur Paper Mills, prepared by a process worked out in the laboratories.
12. Systematic survey of the Hyderabad coal and Hyderabad clays with a view to their rational utilisation.
- 13 Investigation into the utilisation of cotton seed The first step of this scheme is being taken by obtaining requisite equipment for processing cotton seed and one small solvent extraction plant These experiments are expected to give valuable data.

In addition the public have benefitted directly by the laboratories through its technical advice to various firms Important examples are —

1. Technical help and advice to the Hyderabad Chemical & Pharmaceutical Works Ltd , specially with regard to the setting up of Ether plant in Hyderabad which is under way and expansion or their production activities
2. Technical help and advice to the Hyderabad Chemical & Fertilisers Ltd., specially with regard to the expansion of their sulphuric acid plant, setting up of solvent extraction plant and developing their sulphate production.
3. Technical help and advice to the Nizam Sugar Factory, Bodhanj for installation of subsidiary units, specially for the utilisation of their bye-products, carbondioxide and lactic acid.
4. Advice given to the Hyderabad Oils & Pamts Ltd on the purchase of new equipment and re-organisation of the factory

(d) Yes The only case of embezzlement in the Laboratories occurred during the first week of March, 1952, when the shroff absconded with O.S Rs. 2,101-2-0 being the salaries of the staff for the month of February, 1952. Later on it was discovered that he also forged and fraudulently drew an amount of O S Rs. 1,983-5-4 instead of O S. Rs 933-5-4 on a cheque dated the 1st February, 1952, for O.S. Rs 993-5-4 issued by the Director, Central Laboratories, and thus embezzled a further amount of 0<& Rs 1,050.

(e) The matter has been reported to the Police and the Insurance Company. The accounts have been checked by the Government auditors. The Police report is awaited.

64 *Shri G. Raja Ram (At Moor)* Will the hon. Minister for Finance be pleased to state

(1) Whether any money was looted from the State Bank at Umri in the year 1948?

(2) If so, what is the total amount so looted?

(3) What amount, if any, has been recovered?

(4) If so, how has it been disposed of or with whom has it been lying?

*Dt. GS Melkote*

1. Yes. On 30th January, 1948 at 4 P.M. the State Bank at Umri was looted.

2. The total amount so looted was O.S. Rs. 21,19,000 and IG Rs. 3,000.

3. Yes. O.S. Rs. 27,000 were recovered.

4. The amount recovered was credited to the Government.

### Business of the House

*Mr. Speaker*. Now there will be general discussion on the budget.

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*ASM Papi Reddy (Ibrahimpattanam-General)* The other day, I raised a point of order about the hon Chief Minister's comment on the Budget in a press conference and you, Sir, said that it would be considered later on. I would, therefore, request you, Sir, to give a ruling..

*Mr Speaker* I do not follow

*Shi Papi Reddy* The other day, I raised a point of order about the hon Chief Minister's comment regarding the Budget at a Press Conference before it was presented to the House. As you said then that *it* would be considered later, I would request you now to give a ruling on this.

*Mr. Speaker* There was no such conference I made enquiries The hon Chief Minister is here and he will give a reply I was told whatever appeared in Papers was mere a conjecture and that it was not referred by any spokesman or responsible officer. However, the Chief Minister is here and he will give a reply

*The Chief Minister (Shri B Ramakrishna Rao)* I am afraid the hon Member is under a misunderstanding I do not know whether he has completely followed the reports that have appeared in the Press. Unless some reference is given to any particular Press Conference, I can say with authority that I did not hold any Press Conference in connection with the revised Budget In fact, Budget proposals were revised about three or four days before we met and the Press Conference that I held was, I think, about <\*ight or ten days ago which was in regard to certain other matters I have not made any reference to the Revised Budget proposals and if my hon friend draws my attention to the particular report I shall be able to know what exactly he means and what he is referring to. I can, however, at present say that whatever references I have made to the Budget they related to the Budget that was presented three months ago and not to any revised proposals that were being discussed by the Cabinet There was no revised proposal at the time when I held the Press Conference and it is; therefore, irrelevant to say that I made any reference to the prm)»ah which were not wn Snalisepl at that time,

*Shri V D Deshpande* While initiating the discussion on the budget I will try to restrict myself to the tinu-hm t .....

*Mr Speaker*) Has the hon Member got to sa\ ^v tkn^ in this Particular matter<sup>9</sup>

I think the point is quite clear I also tried to find out whether any such statements have been made. Of course I looked into the News Papers, but I found no authoritative statement made on behalf of the Government.

*Shri Papi Reddy* There have been some statements in the Papers

*Mr Speaker* If The hon member sends me those cutting, either in any regional language or in English, it will be easy for me to look into the matter.

*Shri Papi Reddy* I will try to do so.

### **General Discussion on the Budget**

*\*Shri V D Deshpande* While initiating general discussion on the Budget, I will try to restrict myself to the time-limit given. I will be dividing my observations in two parts • Firstly, on the policy of the Government, because of which this Landlord and Police Budget has to be maintained even after the revision of it, and secondly on the different items which have been touched upon by the hon the Finance Minister in his speech regarding the revised budget. I would invite the attention of the House to the remarks of the hon Finance Minister in his Budget speech \*

" But let us not forget that in all human affairs it is not merely the accumulation of worldly material that counts, but what counts primarily is the human factor, the enthusiasm of the men that work these Schemes, for where willingness to work and enthusiasm are to be found no obstacle can come in the way of any one \*

I respond to these feelings of the hon. Finance Minister; but I regret to state, even after observing the policy of the Government for the last two months, that I do not find any change in the policy of Government which if attempted can change this Landlord Police Budget,

I shall first come to the land policy of the Government. We have been promised and we are still waiting for a legislation to

be introduced in this House which will fundamentally change the land policy in Hyderabad State, particularly in areas where the landlords are existing. We are waiting for that, but so far there is no indication that the promise is likely to be fulfilled in this Session. While making my observations as to what is happening at present regarding the Tenancy Act and its implications, I have to say that large-scale evictions are going on in Jangaon, Medak, Nalgonda, Karimnagar, Nanded and in various other places. A suggestion was put forth on behalf of the Socialist Party once and on behalf of the Andhra Mahasabha and the Communist Party that it should be possible for the Government to issue an Ordinance that this eviction should be stopped and that the Police should not lend any support to the Landlord to take the lands unless some sort of an Ordinance is introduced, I am afraid, the evictions will not stop. Recently, I have visited Jangaon and Devamupla villages. I find that the notorious Vishnur Deshmukh has begun his old game of evicting tenants. It will not be out of place for me to remind the House that it was this notorious Deshmukh who was responsible for the many happenings in Telengana. Even after the Police-action, the Government found it necessary to take his property under Court of Wards and restrict his movement, but recently, I notice, that he has been given free licence to evict the tenants. I represented this case recently and I must say gladly that partially some steps have been taken. But if we have to go to every peasant to restore the evicted land, then it will be beyond our physical power to do so. It is absolutely necessary that the evictions should be stopped and some immediate measures taken. I am pressing this point because unless some such step is taken, various expenses on Police and litigation cannot be stopped. Otherwise, that will be the plea to maintain police, to increase expenses on coercive machinery and so on. That is why, we are not in a position to effect any cut in this Budget. Hence what I say is that the policy of the Government has to be so changed as not to necessitate this high expenditure on Police. That is why I am saying that during the last two months I did not find any change in the policy of Government which would have ensured reduction in the Police Budget to the minimum.

Coming to the industrial policy of the Government, I have to say that the various industries which were State-owned were managed effectively. I believe that Operative Directors can better manage the industries than the Professional ones. I admit that the professional ones may be more efficient. They also have the mentality of profit making and with that mentality they cannot get enough profits with which industries can be expanded. The Government can give sufficient wages to the labourers and

can have enough profits with which they can proceed with different plans. Therefore, I submit that the handing over of the industries in the Hyderabad State is not a good policy in the interests of the people, in general. If the exchequer of the Hyderabad State is depleted because of it, I think, the other way of making it up through taxation is not advisable and is not in the interests of the people."

Thirdly, I have to state that the hon. Chief Minister and the hon. Home Minister have promised that attempts would be made to restore the situation in the State. But I regret to say that still more than 200 detenus are in the Hyderabad Central Jail and other places. If honest attempts are made to bring the situation to normal particularly in Telangana, I think, we will be in a position to reduce the Police Budget. Autocracy dies hard and the temptation to use Police to stop the vices of the people is many a time irresistible. The present Government which has inherited the legacy of bureaucracy is accustomed to issue orders under Section 144, Curfew orders, arrests and use Police force. This policy has to be fundamentally changed and administrative machinery should be made to realise that the problems of the people had to be dealt not with bullets, but with sympathy and understanding. It is only through these that we can really have a normal situation. I have said in this House, not once, but many a time, that it is possible to restore the normal situation immediately. But I must say with deep regret that wise counsels have not prevailed and we are now where we were. I once more wish to make it clear that we who are sitting on this side and especially the P.D.F. will extend our hand of co-operation to the Government. We will see that normal situation is obtained in Telangana as soon as possible through mutual discussion and through some amicable settlement. Of course, it is necessary to change our approach. It is necessary to understand that the things which have happened during the last three years require sympathetic understanding, delicate handling, and more than any thing else, mutual confidence. If we are assured that our workers will not be tried nor sent to gallows, we are prepared to introduce certain measures which will ensure mutual confidence, I have to make these observations because unless all these aspects are dealt with properly, we will not be in a position to have a people's budget in the real sense of the term. I am sure, if these observations are paid attention to, we can go to the path of a people's budget.

Coming to the Budget as such, of course, there is deficit. For the first time, we found a deficit of about a few crores, 54 crores or

*The Minister for Labour and Rehabilitation (Shri V.B. Raja)*

Only lakhs, not crores.

*Shri Deshpande* . I am sorry . It is 54 lakhs only . Now we are finding a deficit to the tune of three crores . In a Press statement, I have said that we are not really worried about a deficit budget, if it is in the interest of the people . If we have to face a deficit budget for providing more schools, more hospitals, more amenities to the people and for security of service, then it does not matter . If there is a deficit budget which will be in the interest of the people, we won't mind . But I wonder whether the deficit of 3 crores we are now finding is due to the fact that we have done something in the interest of the people. We have spent about 75 lakhs on various amenity schemes and nation-building activities . As I have said, they are coming from the reduction in the Police Budget.

I said during my speech on budget in the last session that, if really we want to increase the nation building departments, we shall have to reduce the Police Budget . The Government have realised it and, on that aspect, I have to congratulate the hon. the Finance Minister for having introduced a reduction in the Police Expenditure. But, is that enough is my question ? That is not enough . You are spending about 4 crores . In the Budget note, you have said that in the near future, *ie*, in the next budget, you will be able to reduce it to something less than 4 crores. I have gone through the calculations I find that if 51 lakhs of rupees spent on repatriation of certain armed forces till May last is deducted from 3 crores and odd, what we are left with will be about 3 crores 80 lakhs. You are not contemplating a reduction beyond 3 crores 80 lakhs . I have given a concrete scheme to the Government by means of which I assert it is possible to reduce immediately the Police Budget by 2 crores 58 lakhs . I have the calculations under the various heads here ; and, if I am permitted, I shall read them out and show concretely that it is possible to effect this reduction in the Police Budget immediately

In H.S.R.P., a reduction of 80.43 lakhs is possible by disbanding all the six battalions , by repatriating the Union Police, 51.6 lakhs will be saved ; by repatriating the Union Revenue Officials, 15.54 lakhs can be saved ; by abolishing the 81 new police stations, 81 lakhs could be saved ; by disbanding the armed Railway Guard and by asking Centre to take over the duties of railway Police, a saving of Rs. 6.22 lakhs can be effected ; by doing away with Motor transport, petrol and other things given to the Police, we can save about 18 lakhs , if the so-called anti-communist'scheme which means increasing the wireless station! is stopped, we can



save 55 lakhs ; then the District and City Police should be reduced & I have already submitted, to the level of 24,000 which is at present 29,000. Government is paying per constable Rs 1,000 per annum, and if the reduction of 5,000 is there, we can reduce the expenditure by 50 lakhs. Then comes the C I D, which has in recent years grown abnormally and I have suggested that at least it should be reduced to the level obtaining in 1949-50, so as to effect a saving of about 7 lakhs. Altogether, the savings under the different heads above mentioned come to 2 crores 52 lakhs. Finally, I reiterate, it is possible of being effected immediately. In my note, I have suggested that saving under certain heads " should be possible in the coming months and under the other heads, in the coming six months.

If the reduction in the Police Expenditure is given effect to on the lines that I have suggested and if the amount thus saved is spent on nation-building departments, we all welcome that, if the amount is spent on development schemes, we welcome that measure. We want that nation-building departments should grow ; we want that projects should be increased ; we want that the standard of life of our people should increase, at the same time, we want also that there should be reduction in the coercive and forcing machinery of the Government. For that, it is necessary to change the fundamental policy of the Government and unless there is a change in policy it may not be possible to reduce the expenditure.

I do not find any indication in the hon. the Finance Minister's speech that the Government is going to disband the 6 armed battalions. It is and has been my plea that, with the Indian army standing there protecting our borders and in a position to render help when necessary, there is no need for the State Government to have armed force. If the State Government cannot maintain law and order with ordinary Police force, of course, there is Reserve Armed force also apart from the battalions, then it should search its heart and find out why it is so. If they search their heart, they will find that it is their policy which is pro-landlord, and which is pro-blackmarketeer, that is responsible and this calls for a change of policy on the part of the Government which renders the additional Police force unnecessary. I, therefore, once again submit that the Government should find out whether its policy is proper or not and if they should find the people revolting, they must think that there is something wrong with their policy which warrants a change. It is with this ideal before us that we should proceed and ameliorate the lot of the people. It is absurd and preposterous, I say, to think that people can be stopped from revolting by a few foot soldiers armed force; nowhere in the World such an uprising of the people has taken place and in Hyderabad with the

battallions. So the People's Government, a Government which believes in non-violence, a Government which believes in change of heart, should approach the people, not with armed forces but with ameliorative measures and convince the people of what is possible and what is not possible. And, therefore, I submit that I was disappointed at the policy of the Government of not reducing these six battallions as was evident from the Budget speech of hon the Finance Minister. Of course you have to depend more on the co-operation of the people.

Then, coming to the food policy, it is said that because food subsidy is stopped by the centre, we shall have to suffer to the extent of Rs. 58 lacs. Secondly the prices of procurement have been increased, and thirdly it is also said that the prices of imported food-grains have also increased. Because of these three aspects, the hon Finance Minister contends that they had to increase the expense on this item. In this respect probably I might be repeating some of my arguments—it is really the fundamental policy of approach to the agriculturists that matters. I will suggest in this respect, as I have suggested in a statement to the press, that the Government should have a monopoly of purchasing from all the big landlord classes and such other classes who are not themselves producing the grains, and if all the sources are harnessed I believe Government will be in a position to have enough stocks to fight the black-marketeers and to provide enough food to the people. Here I must say that I believe that the policy of decontrol and the policy of abolishing rationing is wrong. I stand for free movement of grain after the season, because it is generally the poor peasant who sells first when the season begins and the blackmarketeers go on hoarding the grain and when the season is over the grains from surplus areas cannot go to the deficit areas because there is restriction on free movement of grains. Therefore, to that extent I agree with the policy of the Madras Government that after the season there should be no restriction on free movement of grain. We may have different zones as has been done there. To that extent I think the policy should be tried here and we support it. With regard to the abolition of rationing, we believe that by doing so a large section of the population will be thrown at the mercy of the blackmarketeers. The hope is maintained that it will be possible to see that the prices get reduced, but it is just possible that in the beginning it may so happen and it may happen in the season, but after that you will find that the prices will increase, and if no stocks are built up by the Government, the blackmarketeers will be in a position to increase the prices of food. Therefore, I believe that the abolition of rationing will not be in the interests of the people. Thirdly, the prices of imported food grains have increased. Yes, but the Hyderabad Government shall have

to take up the matter with the centre. Is it not possible to get food grains cheaply from Pakistan and other countries like China and be in a position to get food grains at cheaper prices? Of course basically we shall have to solve the food problem, namely the problem in the villages which will encourage the peasants to grow more.

As the time at my disposal is very little, I shall presently make observation on the other parts of the budget speech of the hon. the Finance Minister. He has said that we do not have enough to spend on development plans. He is sorry to state that he is not in a position to give all that is demanded. I think he should be in a position to give enough to development plans. When we are demanding more, our Minister should not say that it is not possible to find money for it. He should find out sources for that.

Regarding Hanjan schemes and others, we welcome and like that more should be spent on these schemes.

Regarding Community projects, I have to say that my information goes to show that firstly the administration is top-heavy; secondly, such machinery is imported which is not suitable to the situation here, and thirdly there are too much of fertilisers from outside and no encouragement is given to the local interests. These are the three observations which should be taken into consideration, and I shall take some other time to give my complete observations on the same.

Regarding education, cottage industries and co-operation, of course, these are nation-building departments, and I will be making my observation on the same later.

Regarding taxation, I have to say that the hon. Finance Minister has said that there will be retrenchment in the various Departments. Yes, the departments are top-heavy and retrenchment and economy are necessary. But the hon. Finance Minister has only considered two factors—the first is efficiency and the second is that the development plan should not be affected. I submit that the third factor should also be taken into consideration, namely, no further unemployment should be caused. This is a very great factor, the human factor, to which the hon. Finance Minister referred in the last paragraph of his speech. No further unemployment can be tolerated here. When millions skilled and unskilled, are already unemployed, economy in any department should not mean any further unemployment. New and alternative sources should be found for them either in the five-year plan or by floating other schemes, but there should be no unemployment at any cost. This is my plea.

If I am permitted two minutes more, I would like to refer to the taxes proposed—firstly cash crop and secondly sales-tax

*Shri V B Raju* Since bills are going to be introduced separately for taxation measures, will it not be saving the time of the House if the observations on the new taxation measures are postponed for the present<sup>7</sup>

*Mr Speaker* He is within the time allotted to him

*Shri V D Deshpande* From the point of view of graded agricultural taxation on cash crops, we will welcome the measure. But a flat taxation, which affects the poor peasant, I think, will be inadvisable, in as much as you have no machinery otherwise to provide him the grams which he needs for his day-to-day working at a cheap rate, and therefore, out of the prices of the cash crop he is somehow trying to meet his necessities. If you cut off that by taxing him, it is not possible for the peasant to make the both ends meet. We are opposed to that kind of taxation. But certain areas have to be taxed and on a graded basis that can be done

Sales-tax is a tax which affects every individual. An increase in this tax is, I think, inadvisable. Other sources should be found out with which we can make up the deficit. The death duties are there and we can ask the Centre to provide for us more out of the income-tax receipts, etc. but not by increasing the sales-tax which affects the common man. Of course, I have no objection to the other taxes

To meet the capital expenditure, I cannot make any more observations now, because the time at my disposal is little, and so I shall make my observations on the same later on.

Lastly, I must make it plain that howsoever you may wash a leopard you cannot remove the spots. The hon. Finance Minister has tried to change the budget, but fundamentally, it is a landlords' budget. Probably he is also helpless in the matter. It is the fundamental policy that has to be changed. I hope he would be courageous enough to do that.
